# How it all started

The Foundational Construction Trades (FCT) Training Program was envisioned in line with Alberta's Recovery Plan to get Albertans back to work and to address skill shortages of new entrants to the Industry. Alberta's government remains steadfast in their commitment to achieve goals of diversification, job creation and financial well being.

This training program provides an opportunity for anyone that is interested in a career in construction. The CCIS-FCT program focuses on prospective trainees, with no prior experience or required qualifications to gain entry-level positions within the industry. This program is appealing to those who have just completed high school and want to work in the construction industry. Through this foundational training, there is the potential to advance to a career of many opportunities, whether it be a journeyman or qualified operator, fundamental skill sets are an asset to set career goals. The CCIS-FCT training program provides principal basics to a number of prominent trades: pipe trades, wood trades, bricklaying, painting and drywalling, sheet metal and insulation and electrical components/basics.

In consultation with SAIT and industry specialists, these trades were classified as valuable preparatory areas of construction for interested individuals to gain first-hand insights and understanding of the industry.

It is a well-known fact that people are not able to excel because they are not trained properly bringing shortcomings to the industry due to a lack of experience and being new or unfamiliar to the working environment. Basic and essential training are both evidently important and necessary to be successful. The FCT program is for keen and motivated individuals who seek to develop their skills and perform outwardly in the field of construction. The program has been designed to focus on the strength of strong basic skills in construction.

This program has received hundreds of applications, attracting many applicants who are eager to begin a career in construction. Through collaboration from Industry and certified instructors at CCIS and SAIT, this training program and its graduates will help to enrich Alberta with a diversifed pool of forthcoming construction workers who will be the future faces of Alberta's workforce.

#### Foundational Construction Trades (FCT) Program Outline

The FCT training is 24-weeks in duration and provides basic knowledge and an introduction to construction trades while developing and focusing on the development of essential skills to become knowledgeable in the construction trades.

The main target of the program is to highlight the essential elements that are necessary for successful employment in Alberta. This program centers on essential skills, employability skills for construction industry, computer skills and job search skills.



#### ESSENTIAL SKILLS

# **Essential Skills for Construction Workers**

The objective of this component is to improve and enhance the reading, writing, numeracy, oral communication, and critical thinking of a Construction Worker. Reading, writing, communication. mathematical and basic provided for knowledge are а richer understanding of working trends, needs, and demands and to broaden critical thinking. Learning about data lists and maintenance forms, logbooks, work orders, etc., is also covered.

# **Employability Skills for Construction Industry**

Continuous learning, positive attitudes adaptability, intercultural and behaviors. communication, workplace responsibilities, and teamwork are the focus during the employability skills training; to help understand the identification and the importance of basic concepts. This section of the program will focus on how to identify career goals, analyze personal strengths, and have a positive attitude and approach at work.

#### **Computer Skills**

Focuses on fundamental computer concepts, jargon and the most commonly used applications, including job search and how to apply for jobs online. Resume writing is also covered.

# Working as a Construction Worker in Alberta

Learning about and understanding the construction industry, Employers and Labour Market Information with an overview of Construction Occupations is provided. Employment Rights and Responsibilities, and WCB Coverage in Alberta are also covered.

#### **Job Search Skills**

Emphasis is given to the creation and development of resumes that highlight skills and experiences that will help with job search. Focus is on job search techniques, how to market yourself to secure and maintain employment.

A general introduction and knowledge about the terms and definitions of the construction industry and the English language are covered throughout the training.

## **Academic Upgrading & Trade Math: Mathematical Fundamentals**

Workers are familiarized with the definitions and terms relevant to the construction industry.



#### **Applied Skills Development**

SAIT hands-on training, safety training and certification, and work experience will be completed throughout the training program.





# HANDS-ON TRAINING COMPONENTS AT CCIS & SAIT

The following trades introduce trainees to the world of construction. Each component prepares trainees to understand the fundamental concepts of each trade. This provides an initial and essential grasp in theoretical and practical key elements of the trade, tools and their applications.

An essential part of the training is to identify the common tools used in each trade which are specific to that particular trade, the ability to explain the functions and applications of the tools. A focus on being able to extract relevant information from basic drawings and designs is also a part of the training. Demonstration and awareness of safe work practices and explanation of their role in keeping workplaces safe is a fundamental part of any trade and this is emphasized throughout the training. Furthermore, trainees are provided hands on safety training and certification.

Each trades component is individually focused on highlighting the important basics of foundational knowledge and skills to introduce the trade components, to ultimately initiate possibilities of career advancement.

#### **Wood Trades (Carpentry)**

- Demonstration of fundamental applied woodwork skills through projects such as:
  - a. Residential floor, roof, and wall frame
  - b. Internal drywall, decorating and finishing
  - c. External siding and shingling
- Considerations for working with different types of wood and materials
- Steps and considerations for designing, planning, and completing a basic woodwork project










#### **Sheet Metal & Insulation**

- Demonstration of **fundamental applied trade skills** through projects such as:
  - a. Ductwork
  - b. Spot soldering
  - c. Internal and external insulation
  - d. Cladding
- Considerations for working with sheet metal and insulation materials
- Steps and considerations for designing, planning and completing a basic sheet metal and insulation project









#### **Bricklaying**

- Demonstration of fundamental applied skills
   through a straightforward bricklaying project
- Considerations for working with bricklaying materials
- Steps and considerations for designing, planning, and completing a basic brick project

- Series/parallel circuit fundamentals

- Installing residential wiring and termination of devices

Relevant safety training and certifications are provided:


- Standard First Aid with CPR Level C


Teaching trades and career skills to new Canadians at CCIS is a new experience for me that I have found very rewarding and enjoyable.



### **Building Futures**

The Foundational Construction Trades (FCT) training program is a one-of-its kind program under the umbrella of the former Oil and Gas Training Programs (OGTP) of CCIS. Since 2001, our team has been helping immigrants and new Canadians with transferrable skills by providing them with the training and tools that they need to secure sustainable employment and prepare them towards building a successful life in their new home, Canada.

Many immigrants and new Canadians come to Canada with different backgrounds, talents and skills. Most of them, however, cannot continue in their careers because of lack of Canadian work experience or due to lack of credential recognition. To address these concerns, our team has developed unique programs which gave opportunities to hundreds of CCIS skilled and talented clients to start building their careers.

Interested applicants provide us with their application and complete the intake and selection process. Applicants undergo an in-depth assessment of their suitability and willingness to complete the program. The selection process includes information sessions where we provide a presentation of the program and industry requirements and expectations, language assessments as well as a competency test followed by an interview which are all used to evaluate the readiness and aptitude of an applicant to complete the program.

Even in the midst of the pandemic, the first FCT program was successfully completed. Our intakes consist of talented and diverse individuals coming from different countries. Some more new programs are being explored and hope to launch soon. Updates will be posted on the CCIS website: www.ogtp.ca

- Attend orientation session & complete English test & interview
- Take competency test
- Short-listed candidates are contacted to attend a final selection interview
- Top candidates are selected for the Training
